Subject: Crossbow Crime

Request and Answer:

Your request for information has now been considered. In respect of Section 1(1) (a) of the Act we can confirm that the Police Service of Northern Ireland does hold information to which your request relates. The decision has been taken to disclose the following.

Request 1

How many Home Office Counting Rule (HOCR) non-notifiable reports has your force recorded in respect of breaches of the Crossbows Act 1987 in the last 4 years?

Answer

The Crossbows Act of 1987 does not apply to Northern Ireland. Northern Ireland falls under the Crossbows (Northern Ireland) Order 1988 of which there have been 4 offence codes identified however these may not be considered as 'breaches'.

Request 2

Which crimes under the Prevention of Crime Act 1953 and the Criminal Justice Act 1988 recorded by your force have involved the use of crossbows in the last 4 years?

Answer

The Prevention of Crime Act does not apply to Northern Ireland. A search of all crimes recorded between October 2017 and September 2021 where there was a weapon 'modus operandi' (MO) of a 'crossbow / arrow' linked to the occurrence did not identify any offences recorded under the Criminal Justice Act 1988.

There were three offences classified as 'Possession of other Weapons' where there was a linked weapon MO of 'Crossbow / arrow'; two of these offences were recorded under Article 22(1) of the Public Order (Northern Ireland) Order 1987 and one was recorded under Article 93 of the Justice Act (Northern Ireland) 2011.

<u>Please note:</u> Under the Home Office Counting Rules, possession of an offensive weapon is only recorded where the weapon has not been used during the commission of another notifiable offence. In other words when the weapon is used during the commission of another notifiable offence (e.g. assault), then the other notifiable offence will be recorded and not the weapon possession.

Request 3

Please provide details of any Violence Against the Person crimes recorded by your force where the use of a crossbow was a feature in the last 4 years.

Answer

In response to your request, please see the table below.

The table below is based on incidents involving a weapon identified as a 'Crossbow' where one or more offences of violence against the person were recorded.

Weapon information is held at the incident level. Therefore we are unable to determine which offences within an incident, if any, involved a crossbow. Furthermore, where a crossbow was involved with a specific offence, we are unable to determine the extent to which it was involved.
