Subject: Bailed for Serious Offences from 1st January 2018

Request and Answer:

Your request for information below has now been considered. In respect of Section 1(1)(a) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA) we can confirm that the Police Service of Northern Ireland does hold the information you have requested however it is estimated that the cost of complying with your request for information would exceed the "appropriate costs limit" under Section 12(1) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000. We have explained to you below that when PSNI estimates whether the appropriate limit is likely to be exceeded, it can include the costs of complying with two or more requests if certain conditions are met. In this case those conditions are met and complying with all of your requests would in our estimation exceed that appropriate limit set out in Regulation. We have explained this further below but also we followed the Information Commissioner's Office guidance '*Requests where the cost of compliance exceeds the appropriate limit*' in relation to this request, which also provides further detail on the application of section 12 (1) of the FOIA. You requested the following information from PSNI:

Request 1

In each of the calendar years (January 1 to December 31) going back to January 1 2018 to present day, how many people were bailed having been arrested on suspicion of:

- All sexual offences
- And of which rape
- Murder
- Aggravated Burglary
- Robbery
- Violence against the person

Request 2

For each of the above, please can you break them down by ethnicity?

Request 3

For those same offences, how many people were arrested and Released Under Investigation (RIU)?

Request 4

For each of the above, please can you break them down by ethnicity?

<u>Part 2</u>

Can I please clarify that I am requesting only the occasions when someone was arrested for a different offence to their original offence, not re-arrested for breaching their bail conditions.

Request 5

Since 1 January 2021 [when police bail was increased from 28 days to a maximum of 90 days], how many people were arrested for offences while they were on police bail?

For each of these arrests, please specify what they were arrested for, and what alleged offence they were on bail for.

Answer

Section 17(5) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 requires the Police Service of Northern Ireland, when refusing to provide such information (because the cost of compliance exceeds the appropriate limit) to provide you the applicant with a notice which states that fact.

It is estimated that the cost of complying with your request for information would exceed the "appropriate costs limit" under Section 12(1) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000. Section 12 of FOIA allows a public authority to refuse to deal with a request where it estimates that it would exceed the appropriate limit to either comply with the request in its entirety or confirm or deny whether the requested information is held. The estimate must be reasonable in the circumstances of the case. The 'appropriate limit' is currently £600 for central government and £450 for all other public authorities including PSNI. The relevant Regulations which define the appropriate limit for section 12 purposes are The Freedom of Information and Data Protection (Appropriate Limit and Fees) Regulation 2004 SI 2004 No 3244. These are known as the 'Fees Regulations' for brevity.

Regulation 4(3) of the Fees Regulations states that a public authority can take into account the costs it reasonably expects to incur in carrying out the following permitted activities in complying with the request:

- (i) determining whether the information is held;
- (ii) locating the information, or a document containing it;
- (iii) retrieving the information, or a document containing it; and
- (iv) extracting the information from a document containing it.

Under those regulations PSNI can calculate the time spent on each of these permitted activities at $\pounds 25$ per hour (thus if the activity(s) takes more than 18 hours PSNI will be in excess of the 'appropriate limit').

When a public authority is estimating whether the appropriate limit is likely to be exceeded, it can include the costs of complying with two or more requests if the conditions laid out in Regulation 5 of the Fees Regulations can be satisfied. Those conditions require the requests to be:

- made by one person, or by different persons who appear to the public authority to be acting in concert or in pursuance of a campaign;
- made for the same or similar information; and
- received by the public authority within any period of 60 consecutive working days.

Regulation 5(2) of the Fees Regulations requires that the requests which are to be aggregated relate *"to any extent"* to the same or similar information. This is quite a wide test but public authorities should still ensure that the requests meet this requirement.

Enquiries made in relation to your request have identified that retrieval of this information would exceed the 18 hour cost limit set under the FOI Act by the Secretary of State.

In relation to Request 1, the information requested is not held in a retrievable format that provides the information without manual intervention. The relevant business area has advised the spreadsheet they use only categories the arrest in terms of the PRIMARY arrest reason. If for example a person was arrested for Assault Occasioning Actual Bodily Harm (AOABH) and Sexual Assault and on booking in the AOABH as the primary arrest then that would be what is recorded on the spreadsheet, the Sexual Assault would not be included and would therefore be missed. It would take a manual search of every record in the entire Custody database to ascertain if there were any secondary arrests and what the reason for that was. To conduct the necessary searches, in an attempt to capture the desired information, would grossly exceed the 18 hour cost limit. Additionally, similar issues would arise in relation to your remaining requests.

In accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000, this letter should be considered as a Refusal Notice, and the request has therefore been closed.

Advice and Assistance

Under Section 16 of the FOIA PSNI will always try to assist you to refine your request and provide advice where we can. PSNI have considered how your request may be refined to bring it under the appropriate limit. Unfortunately on this occasion due to the PSNI recording system we are unable to offer you any refinement. However, PSNI can advise of the following:

Request 3 – Released Under Investigation (RIU)? Relates to England and Wales forces as we don't have that as a viable method of disposal.
