Subject: Vehicle Theft

Request and Answer:

Your request for information below has now been considered. In respect of Section 1(1)(a) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA) We can confirm that the Police Service of Northern Ireland (PSNI) does hold the information you have requested however it is estimated that the cost of complying with your request for information would exceed the “appropriate costs limit” under Section 12(1) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000. We have explained to you below that when PSNI estimates whether the appropriate limit is likely to be exceeded, it can include the costs of complying with two or more requests if certain conditions are met. In this case those conditions are met and complying with all of your requests would in our estimation exceed that appropriate limit set out in Regulation. We have explained this further below but also we followed the Information Commissioner’s Office guidance ‘*Requests where the cost of compliance exceeds the appropriate limit*’ in relation to this request, which also provides further detail on the application of Section 12 (1) of the FOIA. Request 1

Could the PSNI tell me how many vehicles were reported stolen in the last five years, broken down by year, and the figures on which areas/districts they were stolen from?

Request 2

Could I also ask what the top ten car models reported as stolen to the PSNI last year are?

Answers 1-2

Section 17(5) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 requires the Police Service of Northern Ireland, when refusing to provide such information (because the cost of compliance exceeds the appropriate limit) to provide you the applicant with a notice which states that fact.

It is estimated that the cost of complying with your request for information would exceed the “appropriate costs limit” under Section 12(1) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000. Section 12 of FOIA allows a public authority to refuse to deal with a request where it estimates that it would exceed the appropriate limit to either comply with the request in its entirety or confirm or deny whether the requested information is held. The estimate must be reasonable in the circumstances of the case. The ‘appropriate limit’ is currently £600 for central government and £450 for all other public

authorities including PSNI. The relevant Regulations which define the appropriate limit for section 12 purposes are The Freedom of Information and Data Protection (Appropriate Limit and Fees) Regulation 2004 SI 2004 No 3244. These are known as the 'Fees Regulations' for brevity.

Regulation 4(3) of the Fees Regulations states that a public authority can take into account the costs it reasonably expects to incur in carrying out the following permitted activities in complying with the request:

- (i) determining whether the information is held;
- (ii) locating the information, or a document containing it;
- (iii) retrieving the information, or a document containing it; and
- (iv) extracting the information from a document containing it.

Under those regulations PSNI can calculate the time spent on each of these permitted activities at £25 per hour (thus if the activity(s) takes more than 18 hours PSNI will be in excess of the 'appropriate limit').

When a public authority is estimating whether the appropriate limit is likely to be exceeded, it can include the costs of complying with two or more requests if the conditions laid out in Regulation 5 of the Fees Regulations can be satisfied. Those conditions require the requests to be:

- made by one person, or by different persons who appear to the public authority to be acting in concert or in pursuance of a campaign;
- made for the same or similar information; and
- received by the public authority within any period of 60 consecutive working days.

Regulation 5(2) of the Fees Regulations requires that the requests which are to be aggregated relate "*to any extent*" to the same or similar information. This is quite a wide test but public authorities should still ensure that the requests meet this requirement.

Enquiries made in relation to your request has identified that retrieval of information to respond to your request would exceed the FOI legislative cost of 18 hours as set by the Secretary of State.

PSNI can advise, enquiries made in relation to your requests has identified that retrieval of this information to respond to your request would exceed the FOI legislative cost of 18 hours as set by the Secretary of State. This information is not held in a retrievable format that provides the information without manual intervention, and a comprehensive search would need to be conducted to retrieve this information.

The relevant business area has determined that Request 1 is over cost as PSNI have initially identified over 5,700 records that would need manually examined. It is estimated that to complete the manual examination of all offences would take approximately 190 hours, grossly exceeding the legislative timescale of 18 hours as set by the Secretary of State.

PSNI can further advise we are unable to provide information on the number of stolen vehicle reports, because of a) the data quality for the 'stolen' classification in the vehicle table, and b) the principal offence rule in the Home Office Counting Rules which states that where multiple offences occur, only the most serious offence is recorded. This means that if a vehicle was stolen in addition to other higher offences, we would not be able to identify it. This also means that we are unable to identify the most commonly stolen car models.

Following the Home Office Counting Rules, the single most serious crime will be recorded against a victim, even when there have been multiple crimes. All crimes will be investigated and potentially prosecuted, but only one will be recorded. This means that if, for example, someone was victim of a

serious assault and had their vehicle stolen by the same perpetrator, only the assault would be recorded. Therefore it is possible that any and all offences that are 'more serious' would need to be checked.

In accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000, this letter should be considered as a Refusal Notice, and the request has therefore been closed.

Advice and assistance

You may wish to submit a refined request in order that the cost of complying with your request may be facilitated within the 'appropriate limit'. In compliance with Section 16 of the Act, I have considered how your request may be refined to bring it under the appropriate limit.

- **Request 1** – PSNI can provide the number of recorded offences of '48 Theft or unauthorised taking of a motor vehicle' where a vehicle was classified as 'stolen' broken down by police district. However this will not capture all vehicles reported as stolen, as it will not include vehicles stolen as part of a higher offence.

Submission of a refined request would be treated as a new request, and considered in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000, including consideration of relevant Part II exemptions.
